## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

## **Curricular Aspects**

The institution is permanently **affiliated to University of Mumbai**. The syllabus is framed by the BOS (Board of Studies) of respective subjects of University of Mumbai and strictly followed by the institution. **Dr.V.N.Yadav, Dr. Anupama Gawde, Dr. Manisha Gharat are members of the BOS** and involved in syllabus framing, designing and modifications. Teachers are deputed to workshops organised by University of Mumbai for revised syllabus, syllabus framing workshops.

In the beginning of academic year, **Academic Calander** is prepared with the tentative dates of activities to be conducted. Principal, HODs, other members of all departments prepare **teaching plan** to complete the syllabus in stipulated time. **Time-table committee** prepares the schedule of lectures as per the work load of each department and displayed to students after the consent of Principal.

Teachers follow **ICT methods** along with regular class room teaching for effective delivery of the syllabus. However, proper attention is paid to follow the pedagogy towards real understanding and hence **PPT** 

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presentations, group discussions, Field visits, Study Tours, Tutorials, Practical, Street plays are some of the methods in learning process and being adopted.

Syllabus of respective subjects always cannot cover the needs and interests of the students. The institution identifies the different interests of the students and introduced **Certificate Courses** to enhance the skills of the learners. During the five years, the institution introduced and completed **24 certificate courses** of different skills.

Cross cutting issues like professional ethics, human values, gender, environment and sustainability are also integrated in the curriculum of subjects like Foundation Course, Environmental Studies etc.

The institution follows structured feedback mechanism by Feedback Committee and IQAC. The **feedback is collected from all stakeholders like students, parents, teachers, employers** on the academic performance and facilities offered by the institution. The data collected is analyzed and reported to the higher authorities. Accordingly, action taken report is prepared and published on website for implementation.

## **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Institution caters eight UG programs and two PG programs. Students from different demography, socioeconomic, cultural and educational backgrounds enroll for different programs. Students' enrolment percentage is around 93. Institution strictly follows the admission rules and guidelines of University of Mumbai and Government of Maharashtra. The rules and regulations of Government of Maharashtra are followed for Reservation Policy of SC/ST/NT/OBC. The college has its admission policy for the financially weaker sections and provides installment fee payment facility for the needy. The online admission procedure ensures transparency and wide access for enrollment. The Student Teacher Ratio in Self-Finance programs is 40:1 and in BA, B.Com it is 90:1. Teachers adopt various learner-centered methods like participative learning, experiential learning and collaborative learning through group discussions, debates, projects, presentations, experiments, practical in Computer lab, internship and application of ICT resources, to make learning more meaningful. The ICT enabled teaching methods are used by all the teachers. Institution appoints qualified and efficient staff as per the recruitment procedures laid down by UGC, Government and University, The ratio of Full-time Teachers against sanctioned posts is 100 percent. Teachers are encouraged to publish research articles, books, edited chapters in books. They are deputed to Refresher, Orientation programmes, Seminars, Conferences of National and International level to refine their knowledge and teaching capabilities. A structured feedback is collected and analysed on the performance of teachers by students and reported to concerned authorities to take appropriate action. The evaluation process includes semester wise examination pattern of affiliated University. Examination Committee conducts exams of I,II,III,IV,V and VI semester. Masking of answer papers is followed to ensure impartial assessment to students. The results are declared with in stipulated period and grievances related to examination are redressed with proper regulatory mechanism. Class tests are conducted in regular intervals to evaluate the students' performance, students are identified as slow and advanced learners. Parent Teacher meetings are organised. Remedial lectures are conducted for slow learners. Advanced learners are encouraged by various co-curricular activities. POs, PSOs and COs are evaluated and the attainment is calculated by each subject teacher consequently the improvements are undertaken

## Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution has well defined research culture promoting policy. It promotes teachers to participate and present papers in seminars, conferences of State, National and International level. Publishing articles in UGC recognized journal, Number of books and chapters in edited volumes/books published and papers published in national/ international conference proceedings during last five years has increased to 79. Financial support is provided by the institution to attend the seminars and conferences and membership of academic organisations. Library with 54000 number of reference books and 52 journal and 6 Magazine of all programmes and internet facility in UGC Research Center encourages the teachers towards research.14 teachers are awarded with Ph.D. out of 18 permanent staff. Research activities are upgraded by Research Development Cell for teachers as well as students. University of Mumbai conducts research competition under 'Avishkar'. Our teachers and students regularly participate in it.

It is also initiated to collect the interest of students in other than courses offered under prescribed programmes.

## 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

a) Institution initiated the process of registration of students for ABC as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai. All students registered for ABC and it is reported to the University. b) Institution is affiliated to University of Mumbai hence it follows the instructions of University. c) Institution collaborated with around 20 organisations and corporates through functional MOUs. Placement and Career Guidance Cell, Counselling Cell, Sports and Gymkhana Committee and Departments conducts Seminars, workshops, guidance lectures, field visits, training, study tours, internships, placements etc. d) The curriculum is framed by the affiliated University. Faculty deliver the lectures on prescribed syllabus of the subject in classroom teaching. Use of ICT in the form of PPT presentations, YouTube, Screening films, Projects, Assignments, chapters in text books, synoptic answers, reading material, students' WhatsApp groups etc. are some of the pedagogical approaches practiced by the faculty. e) Faculty created awareness among students about the significance of ABC and its role in upcoming years in education area. It reflected in 100 per cent registration for ABC by the students.

### 3. Skill development:

## 1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### **Response:**

- 1] The institution follows the curriculum which is set by the Board of Studies, University of Mumbai. The same curriculum based on different subjects is taught, explained and delivered by teachers through different teaching techniques. A detailed time table is prepared and provided to students for smooth functioning of lectures and completion of syllabus on time. **Teaching plans** are prepared by every faculty member to cover the syllabus in a given time frame. Principal Dr. V. N. Yadav, Dr. Anupama Gawade and Dr. Manisha Gharat are the **members of Board of Studies** who provide valuable suggestions to Board of Studies for change and upgradation of syllabus from time to time. Appointed Teachers also set papers for **University examinations**. An **Academic calendar** is prepared every year for proper functioning and timely execution of academic and extracurricular plans and activities. **Principal conducts meetings with Department Heads** and then Heads conducts **Departmental meetings** with teaching staff to ensure effective, efficient and timely implementation and completion of curriculum and activities.
- 2] Delivery of lectures is through chalk and talk method. New techniques of teachings like PowerPoint Text Presentation, You Tube Channel, Group Discussions, Tutorials, Practicals in Computer Laboratory, Exhibitions, Industrial visits, Field visits, and Study tours are undertaken for effective deliverance and completion of curriculum.
- 3] A continuous evaluation through a 2-semester exam pattern in each academic year for the students is followed as per the University of Mumbai norms. This is statutory and it helps to monitor students' progress and performance term wise. Class tests are also being undertaken to prepare students for semester exams. Projects, Assignments and Viva Voce also form a part of internal assessment of the students. Guidance lectures are arranged for TYBA, TYBCOM, M. COM., B.Sc.I.T., M.Sc. I.T. and Self-Finance course students. Subject Experts from different colleges are invited to guide students for university exams to help students to excel. Class tests both online and offline are conducted and the students are identified as advanced or academically weak students. Advanced students are encouraged to excel their performance with additional attention. Remedial lectures are organized especially for the academically weak students. These lectures are instrumental in enhancing their academic performance.
- 4] During Covid-19 period, online lectures were conducted by teachers through apps such as Zoom, Google Meet, and Microsoft Teams. WhatsAPP groups of students and concerned subject teachers were formed and the details of time-table of lectures, syllabus, links of lectures, synoptic notes, PPTs of lectures, examination time-tables, guidelines of University were posted regularly. It helped in completion of syllabus during the academic year. Online Examinations of I,II,III,IV,V and VI semester were conducted as per the instructions of affiliated University. Non-academic lectures were also conducted to

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support the students during pandemic period. The idea was to relax and release pressure from students.

5] The institution follows one of the best practices of felicitating and honoring meritorious students every year to encourage them to propel to higher levels on the College Foundation Day.

- The College has 4 Computer Lab and 1 Electronic Lab where practical sessions are conducted for different courses.
- A Scanner and Photocopying machine is also available.
- All of these are connected with internal LAN and the Internet is accessible on all the computers and laptops.

Teachers use various soft ware of ICT tools like WhatsApp groups, each class teacher create the WhatsApp group with students and all the subject teachers. Teachers post all relevant information of both academic and non-academic in the group like syllabus, examination pattern, photographs of lectures, problems to be solved, assignments, google forms, notes, YouTube videos etc

- Google forms are used for conducting class test of MCQs, surveys etc
- Google Meet, Zoom and Microsoft Teams are used to conduct on-line lectures
- Students are exploring, navigate, and handle real-world problems in a controlled virtual environment using web-based simulations.
- Participatory learning is made possible by technologies like smart boards and interactive displays, which let students interact with the course content directly.
- Students are able to talk, argue, and reflect on a variety of issues by participating in Online discussions and forums.
- The use of games: Problem-solving activities become more interesting and dynamic by incorporating gaming aspects into learning to utilize different ICT tools.
- Platforms for project-based learning: Students are encouraged to use the information they acquire in class to address issues in the real world by utilising ICT tools that support project-based learning.
- College Library is one of the significant learning resources for both students and teachers. The

total number of books in the College Library are more than 54,000. There are 52 Journals and 6 Magazine available in the library. N-List database of more than 1,95,809 e-books and 6293 E-Journal's is provided by the library the library provides OPAC (Open Public Access Catalogue) which provides searching of book facility. All the teaching staff and students are familiar with all the latest ICT tools and E-Resources in the Library.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

#### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

#### **Response:**

The internal/external evaluation mechanism is transparent, and the grievance redressal procedure is timely and efficient.

The college is indefinitely associated with the University of Mumbai. The examination and assessment procedures are rigorously adhered to by the University of Mumbai.

Each program's assessment is separated into six semesters and two semesters every year. The evaluation system for B.A. and B. Com is 100 points each subject. The semester is split into 75:25 marks per course for BMS, BBI, BAF, BFM, B.Sc. (IT), and B.Sc. (C.S). The 25-point assessment is broken into 20 and 5 points. M.Com follows a 60:40 mark pattern, whereas M.Sc. (IT) follows a 60:40 and 50 practical examination method.

The college administers three class exams, and the average of the three is worth 20 points. Participation in the classroom is worth 05 points. Practical exams for B.Sc. (IT) and B.Sc. (CS) are 50 marks. On behalf of the University of Mumbai, the college **examination committee** conducts Regular, ATKT (Allowed To Keep Terms), Additional Exams (Medical conditions, Participation in University events) and Supplementary Exams (Students unsuccessful in regular examination) for all six semesters.

Time-tables of concerned examinations are intimated to students well in advance.

During examination any malpractice of students is registered and reported to Unfair means Committee. This committee follows the guidelines of affiliated University and act on it.

After the exam the respective subject teacher is directed to grade the answer papers in accordance with the model answer paper. The moderation of the external concerned subject teacher ensures uniformity in

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evaluation by the subject instructor. The institution's strategy of **masking answer papers** and exchanging mark sheets supplied by subject instructors also ensures **unbiased evaluation** in the examination procedure. The college examination committee announces the final results of the I, II, III, and IV semesters, as well as ATKT, within the specified time frame and displayed on college website. Gracing rules of affiliated University are strictly applied to concerned cases. Projects, Home Assignments, Group Discussions, PowerPoint Text Presentations, and Viva Voice are all part of the continual assessment process, in addition to term-end exams. Grievances about the assessment of concerned students are resolved within the time frame specified by the Revaluation system. However, owing to COVID-19, the Regular examination of VI semester and ATKT examination of I, II, III, IV, V, and VI semesters were held online in 2019-20 and 2020-21 in accordance with University of Mumbai regulations. The paradigm change in the examination and assessment procedure was effectively implemented by the institution.

First-year students are given motivational lectures that emphasize establishing wise goals in order to raise knowledge of some of the anticipated consequences, such as social development and employability.

#### **Response:**

The institution has diligently crafted an ecosystem to foster knowledge generation, research, innovation, and technology development. This thriving environment is a result of the concerted efforts of various committees, cells, and departments. The IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) and the Research and Development Cell play pivotal roles in instilling research and creative thinking among students and faculty.

To achieve this, the IQAC and Research and Development Cell regularly organize Research Workshops, Faculty Development Programs, and E-Learning Sessions for both faculty members and students. A notable initiative was the organization of a 10-day **Faculty Development Programme (FDP) on Research Methodology** at the State Level, in collaboration with the WRC Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR).

The institution also recognizes the importance of nurturing entrepreneurial spirit. Hence, it has established an **Entrepreneurship Development Cell** comprising faculty members and students.. This cell acts as a mentor, organizing training programs, seminars with successful entrepreneurs, and innovative ideas competitions to promote specialized knowledge in Commerce, Management, and Information Technology. Various awareness programs, workshops, industrial visits, and interactions with young entrepreneurs are conducted to empower students with entrepreneurial skills.

Dedicated to professional and skill development, the institution has set up an **English Language lab** to enhance communication skills, vocabulary, and pronunciation. **TNS India Foundation**, through the Campus to corporate Careers(C2CT) Program, has set up a **Satellite Centre** to bridge infrastructure gaps for disadvantage youth.

In an effort to introduce value education, the Research and Development Cell organized a workshop on **Universal Human Values and Ethics**, integrating these aspects into the present curriculum of the Higher Education Institution (HEI).

Awareness on academic integrity is actively promoted through workshops. The National Intellectual Property Awareness Mission (NIPAM) organized a workshop on **Intellectual Property Rights**. Additionally, the Research and Development Cell conducted a State Level Webinar on Academic Integrity in research and Publication, including guidance lectures on penalties for plagiarism, fostering academic awareness among postgraduate students and faculty.

To encourage participation in research conventions, the Research and Development Cell conducts an Intra-College Research Paper Presentation Competition. The institution has excelled in external research conventions, such as the University of Mumbai Research Competition - "Avishkar," where it secured a gold medal and first rank in the 17th Inter-College Research Convention.

Students inclined towards creative writing are encouraged to contribute research papers. Several students have participated and presented their research projects in Inter-Collegiate competitions, achieving recognition at the national level.

Faculty members have actively contributed to research, presenting papers in state, national, and international seminars and conferences. Our College Faculty has won 2nd Prize for research paper presented in International Research Conference. The institution supports interdisciplinary projects, providing necessary financial support. Notably, an MSC IT student received a research grant of Rs. 35,000 from the University of Mumbai.

Key indicators of potential growth in research activities include increased publications in peer-reviewed journals, UGC CARE-listed journals, collaborations, and the establishment of doctoral programs. This multifaceted approach underscores the institution's commitment to nurturing a culture of research, innovation, and academic excellence.

- The college has a spacious ground covering an area of 30,352 sq.mts (3 hectares) for conducting outdoor sports like Cricket, Kabaddi, Long jump, Volleyball, Shotput, Badminton, Kho-Kho, Football, Tug of War, Basket Ball etc.

- A Bed, Stretcher and Wheel Chair are readily available and ambulance will be made available in case of an emergency.
- Yoga and Meditation sessions are held for students and staff for their health and mental peace.
- The college provides its infrastructure to CA, Railways, Banking Services, other State and Union competitive examinations and for Film shooting during vacations, on holidays and Sundays,.
- The college also provides its infrastructure to schools and associations like Municipal Corporation, Election Commission (Polling center), Census, NGOs etc. to organize social and religious activities & NCC leadership camp.
- During Covid-19, college in association with MBMC and police department helped in data collection for migration. The college also served as a Vaccine Centre and held a Blood Donation Camp.
- The college ensures that differently-abled students are provided necessary help. Ramps have been provided near the steps. Separate seating arrangement is provided in the library. Lift facility is also provided to such students.

### 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

#### 4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

- The college library was established in the year 1994, Library is spread in an area of 3400 sp.ft. The library provides LAN facility for the computers and the functioning of the entire library is automated with 'Libpro' software along with Barcode technology.
- Two separate computer systems are provided for Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) to get quick access to books. Entire library is under CCTV surveillance.
- Five High Definition CCTV cameras are installed for better supervision and administration of the college Library. The staff and the students use the computer system with internet at UGC sponsered Network Resource Center in the library.
- The Library Advisory Committee is formed comprising the Principal, Senior Faculty Members

#### and the Librarian. The Committee lays down

- 1. Sound Library Policies and Regulations,
- 2. Makes budgetary provisions for procurement of books, periodicals and other reading materials
- 3. Discusses and advises suitable solutions to library related problems and issues.
- The Library facilities are made available for the current students, ex-students and Staff. The maintenance and the cleaning of the libraries are done with the help of the non-teaching staff.
- The college Library has 15 computers with internet connections. Most of the Computers and their accessories are maintained on Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMC) by private agencies.
- The College Library Subscribes to the Project entitled "National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST)", being jointly executed by the UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium, INFLIBNET Centre and the INDEST-AICTE Consortium, IIT Delhi. As an authorized user from colleges registered under NLIST programme, we have access e-book and e-journal.
- The college library regularly organises Book Exhibitions cum Sale. Various publishers are invited for same.
- For analysing the visitors and utilisation of the library, an Automated Footfall Counting System has been Installed with Barcode Technology. It helps to understand the time duration a user spends in the library. Automated Footfall Counting System helps us know the time period when the libraries are mostly crowded. It is the best way to find out the boom time. This is where measuring footfall becomes handy because not only it will help the staff to analyze user's time but also can record the number of visitors every hour.
- The College library proudly announces the 'Best Library User Award' every year. Two students, one male and one female are conferred the award on the occasion of college Foundation Day.
- On the occasion of Birth Anniversary of Dr. S. R. Ranganathan, Father of Indian Librarianship, Book Exhibition is organized every year.
- Wachan Prerana Diwas is observed by paying homage to Veteran Scientist and Former President APJ Abdul Kalam, every year on 15th October. Book Exhibition is also organised to commemorate the day.
- Library provides Reprography Service.
- Through Book Bank facility, college library provides maximum book sets to the students.
- Enabling unit for differently abled students: Separate seating arrangement and special entry into the library from the door closest to the staircase is provided. Special services like Circulation, Reference Service, Reprography, OPAC is made available at his/her seating arrangement.

## 5.4 Alumni Engagement

#### **Response:**

The Alumni ensure a continued contact with the College and facilitate academic and creative involvement in the progress and activities of the College

- The Association plays a very vital role in various sports and cultural events conducted by the college. They provide their seminal support to accomplish these activities successfully. In order to regulate the functioning of trust, the Board of Management was established. The trust laid the foundation of Shankar Narayan College of Arts and Commerce in 1994. Further Post Graduation courses M. Com and M.Sc I.T. and MMS started under AICTE rules.

To offer accessible quality education after matriculation, the Junior College of Arts, Science and Commerce under Maharashtra state board and recently Engineering Degree courses have been started.

#### **Governance and Leadership:**

The Institute conducts regular internal and external audit for salaried and non-salaried sections of the college. The management appoints internal auditor for internal audit work to regularize and stream line the accounts of the college. Statutory auditor is also appointed to audit thorough accounts, transaction and to ensure registers are maintained for movable and immovable properties. Statutory auditors verify all entries in concerned registers. Regular cash checking is also done by the respective authorities. All Government payments and disbursements are being promptly and effectively made in time without any delay. All vouchers and payments made by the college are also verified by the statutory auditor. The irregularities are reported to the management for rectification, if any is found. All finalized audited statements related to receipts and payment books, cash entries, income and expenditure statements and balance sheets are also reported to the Management. The Joint Director Office, Government of Maharashtra also audits college account and release salary and non salary grants to the college. Even Accountant General, Maharashtra audits accounts intermittently or after specific period. Hence there is whole control of the accounts of different agencies. Thus, all reports verified and prepared by statutory auditor are submitted and filed returns to respective government authorities within the prescribed time limit.

Thus, record of financial resource mobilisation and utilisation of funds is maintained thoroughly. This helps in appropriate financial management of funds of the institution. Hence, the transparency and accountability is adequately maintained while managing the funds of the institution.

It was its endeavor that earned 'A' Grade in reaccreditation by NAAC in 2017. The IQAC is committed to continue its journey towards betterment in all possible ways in the days to come. The IQAC was constituted as per the guidelines of NAAC in 2006. It is always engaged and contributed seminally and significantly in all possible aspects.

At the outset IQAC prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per the guidelines and parameters of NAAC and submits within the prescribed time limit. The said reports are circulated among all the stakeholders for suggestions and feedback. The reports are availed on the official website of the institution.

The institution follows the curriculum framed and recommended by the University of Mumbai as it is permanently affiliated to the said university. However, the curriculum is implemented in a proper and systematic way to achieve the Programme Outcomes (POs), Course Outcomes (COs), and Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) at its utmost level. IQAC organized a workshop for all the teachers to get proper understanding of POs, COs and PSOs.

IQAC signed a number of Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) with various organisations to get linked with them. Many programmes and activities are conducted by IQAC in collaboration these institutions who have signed MOU with the institution.

The academic annual plan in the form of academic calendar is prepared in the beginning of each academic year by IQAC for smooth functioning of academic and co-academic activities. The plan is shared with all the stakeholders for perusal. All the departments and committees strive for the successful execution of the preplanned activities and prorgammes. All the teachers prepare monthly teaching plan and submit in the first week of every month to the Principal.

IQAC motivates and guides the teachers and students to undertake various research activities. Six of the teachers completed their Ph.D. in last five years. Some of the teachers have undertaken and completed Minor Research Projects in the University of Mumbai. One faculty member besides the Principal is a research guide in the University of Mumbai. A bulk number of papers are presented and published at various levels by the teachers in previous five years. The students are also involved in research activity. A student was awarded for the Best Research Presentation at State Level.

IQAC has taken positive initiative for the betterment of ICT facilities for effective teaching learning. As per the recommendation by the IQAC, white boards are installed in all the class rooms in previous five years. Some of the class rooms have been provided with the facility of projector. Language Laboratory is set up as per one of the recommendations for practical learning of English language. A spacious meeting hall with ICT facilities is set after accreditation in 2017. Administrative and examination sections are also equipped with ICT facilities and necessary soft wares.

- **3. Context:** India is an open minded and comprehensively diverse nation and Mumbai and the suburbs resonate exactly the same spirit accommodating people of all faiths, castes, creeds peacefully. However, the nation has vouched for the concussion of technology which has brought in many vices among the youngsters who are the prime stakeholder of our college posing a substantial threat to the values and ethics which India has been cherishing for centuries, as we are the torchbearer to rest of the world when it comes to cultural heritage and practicing the values and ethics in everyday life. #### 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

#### 7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

#### **Response:**

The institution has performed comprehensively for the stakeholders in multiple areas since its inception. The prime stakeholders of the institution are the students who have been academically taken care of better than the institutions in the vicinity. Shankar Narayan College of Arts and Commerce was established with the vision of providing students Higher Education who either belong to lower middle class and the Below poverty Line and in 1994, the year of college inception, there was no higher education institute in Bhayander. Bhayander is an industrial area that is comprised of citizens who are migrated from various parts of India and the human resource is mostly unskilled. The income of this population is one lakh or less per annum and the higher education for their wards would have been financially taxing in the absence of our college that furnishes high quality education to them that suits their pockets. The data analysis clearly shows that the fee structure in Shankar Narayan College is far cheaper than the local schools. The college finds privilege in embracing thousands and thousands of such students in last 27 years and that is the distinctive and thrust area: students who are the priority of the institution. In addition to this, optimum lots of the students are the first generation learners. By considering the financial condition of the students, the college has furnished higher education to them, created first graduates in the thousands of families and made them market ready to have respectable and handsome job opportunities. The college has always adhered to its vision that underlines, mainly, the educational empowerment of financially weaker sections of the society.

The statistical analysis of the parents' income of the last five years: 2017-2018 to 2021-2022 have posited striking numbers. The maximum chunk of parents that is 75 % that has annual income of 2.5

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lakhs or less and even in this lot more than 50 % parents have annual income of Rs. 1.5 lakhs. Pragmatically speaking, the optimum parents' monthly income is 15 thousand per month or less. The students of the college, in terms of financial stratification, belong to lower middle class or may be termed as poor class also. Auto rickshaw drivers, labourers, small stall owners like Paanipuri and other snacks who have never been to college, are the parents who wish to see their wards and graduates and post graduates. The policy of the college of charging minimal fees is inspired by the vision we adhere to and the Constitution of India, especially Right to Education which has embraced the pupils from poor and lower middle class. Despite a pocket friendly fee structure, the college also provides the installment facility to students. In addition to this the Placement and Career Guidance Cell of the college offers part time job for the students who wish assist themselves or their family financially.

The students have also shown the same grit and determination while catching the opportunities furnished by the college with both the hands. They have performed exceptionally well in academics and other relevant activities also. Hundreds of students work during their period of graduation, may it be part time or full time and many job opportunities are provided by the college itself. Additionally one social perspective needs to be mentioned here and that is the maximum students admitted in Shankar Narayan College are the First Generation Learners. It implies a student whose mother and father are either illiterates or less educated or they do not have graduation. Proposing an opportunity to the students who are first generation learners with affordable fees is a social commitment that the college has upheld relentlessly. Underlining the significance of the First Generation Learners is in correspondence with the nation building because, if to treat Bhayander as a microcosm, the college has given thousands and thousands graduates in thousands of educationally and financially poor families that has transformed their lives for good. It is comparatively difficult to audit the changes that our college has brought in the families of Mira Bhayander, but it no one can deny the existence of a graduate in the uneducated family and the further social and economic consequences which must be fruitful and socially satisfying.

In addition to this, many of the students which are mentioned as the first generation learners have seen substantial academic progression. Many students further completed post-graduation in Commerce, Accountancy, Information Technology and Management. The college itself provides courses for the same. The college has post graduate programs in Commerce and Information Technology. The college also has a sister concern Rohidas Patil Institute of Management Studies that offers post graduate programs in Marketing, Finance and Human Resource, that too in affordable fees and installments.

This constitutionally spirited model of education with economical fees for the students of financially poor background with equally diverse social and cultural ambience has been a great success in terms of producing first graduates of the family and employability in the last five years, and rather in the whole history of the institution.
