2.1 Curricular Aspects :		
2.1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation	 Academic programmes are in tune with vision and mission of the institution. Curriculum prescribed by affiliating university namely university of Mumbai. Teaching carried out after preparing academic calendar and teaching plans. 	
2.1.2 Academic Flexibility :	 Academic flexibility is limited as permitted by CBCS. The college offers undergraduate programs and also two post-graduate courses. About half the numbers of courses are offered on self-finance basis. 	
2.1.3 Curriculum Enrichment:	 Cross cutting issues suitably addressed through expert talks, presentations etc. The college offers a certificate / diploma courses in human rights and Microsoft. Curriculum enrichment promoted through seminars, conferences, invited lectures etc. 	
2.1.4 Feedback System :	 Feedback on curriculum is regularly collected from students and other stackholders. Mechanism of analyzing feedback needs to be improved. 	
2.2 Teaching-Learning & Evaluation :		
2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile :	 Admission process given wide publicity through prospectus, college website etc. Admission granted on merit. University rules for reservations followed. 	
2.2.2 Catering to Student Diversity:	 For advanced learners special courses are conducted to provide them additional knowledge and enhance their employability. Differently abled students are suitably handled. Remedial classes and tutorials are conducted for academically weak and slow learners as per UGC guidelines. 	
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:	Lecture method is predominantly used.ICT enabled and audio visual aids also in use.

2.2.4 Teacher Quality:	 Teachers have participated in seminars, workshops, orientation programs and refresher courses. Teachers are recruited as per UGC and Mumbai University norms. Of the 18 permanent teachers 7 are PhD and 8 M. Phil holders.
2.2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms :	 College has little role in examination reforms. The institution follows the Choice Based Grading System of the university. Evaluation processes are conveyed to teachers and students through prospectus and special notices. In case of any grievances, provision of revaluation is in place.
2.2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes:	 Learning outcomes are yet to be formally stated. Student's performance is assessed through internal assessment. Pass percentage is generally good.
2.3 Research, Consultancy & Extension:	
2.3.1 Promotion of Research:	 Two faculty members have completed Minor Research Projects of UGC and 6 faculty members are pursuing the minor research projects of the University of Mumbai. The institutions is not a recognized research center. Research development cell of the institution encourages faculty.
2.3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research:	 Principal and one more teacher is approved research guide. The institution has been spending about 1% of its budget on research. No seed money is given to faculty for research. The institution needs to get funds for research from industry and other funding agencies.
2,3.3 Research Facilities:	 Library has INFLIBNET, N-list facility and also tie-up with British Council Library. Adequate research resources in terms of books and journals.

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2.3.4 Research Publications and Awards :	 No awards received from any professional bodies. Faculty has published quite a few books and research papers. College has published a research journal with ISSN in 2015. 	
2.3.5 Consultancy:	 Resource generation through consultancy yet to take place. Areas of expertise not identified and advertised. 	
2.3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility:	 Extension activities are carried out through NSS, NCC, competition study center etc. College has won several best NSS unit awards. Focus is laid on social issues like AIDS awareness, cleanliness, blood donation, global warming etc. 	
2.3.7 Collaboration	 One important collaboration which the college library has is with British Council Library. Another net worthy MOU is with Microsoft Imagine Academy on Network Security Arrangements. The college needs to have several collaborations with industry and other institutions of higher learning. 	
2.4 Infrastructure and Learning Resources	*	
2.4.1 Physical Facilities:	 A college has a campus area of 2.28acres (10800 sq. mts.) It has 49 class rooms including 3 seminar rooms equipped with public Address system, LCD, projector etc. The institution has also got a specious playground, a gym, auditorium and a canteen. 	
2.4:2 Library as a Learning Resource:	 The institution has rich library with 50196 books and 61 journals and magazines. The seating capacity of the library is 180. It provides special services like OPAC & reprography, internet etc. The library is computerised with N-list subscription under INFLIBNET. 	

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2.4.3 IT Infrastructure :	 laptops, 19 printers and 18 projectors. The budget regularly provide for procurement and repair of computers. All the computers are Connected to internet and networked together.
2.4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities :	 Elevator and Xerox machines are maintained through AMC. Security service has been outsourced. Maintenance of campus facilities is carried out from college own funds. A full time computer technician has been appointed to ensure smooth functioning of computers.
2.5 Student Support and Progression :	
2.5.1 Student Mentoring and Support: 2.5.2 Student Progression:	 Pramila Institute of Administrative Careers helps students to prepare for competitive examinations. A good number of students from weaker sections are granted various scholarships and free ships. Students are covered by an insurance scheme. A small proportion of students go far higher education in different education as institutions. Placement and Career Guidance cell of the college is yet to be activated. Pass percentage of students in university exam is quite high.
2.5.3 Student Participation and Activities :	 The college has got students council as per Mumbai university guidelines. College magazine 'Vinay' is published every year. Students actively participate in college level, university level competitions, National level sports competition (kick-boxing championship) and cultural activities. Some students got gold and silver medals in state level competitions.

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2.6 Governance, Leadership and Management:	
2.6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership:	 The college promotes participatory management by involving teachers in various committees and consulting them in all types of decisions. The vision and mission of the college are in confirmity with the national objectives of the higher education. With the support from the top management the principal provides inspiring leadership.
2.6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment:	 The perspective plan is developed by management after consulting all stake holders. Organizational structure of the institution is well defined. The institution has an active grievance redressal cell covering students, faculty and non-teaching staff.
2.6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies:	 Performance of faculty monitored through self-appraisal reports. Faculty encouraged to participate in seminars, orientation programmes and refresher courses. Pay scales as per UGC norms and PF facility available.
2.6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization :	 The sources of funding are fee, the state government support, UGC and management contributions. Accounts are regularly audited both internally and externally. Efforts need to be made to get funds from industry and other research funding agencies.
2.6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System:	 The institution has set up Internal Quality Assurance System since 2006 with 3 external members. Quality assurance policies of IQAC are properly disseminated Fixing of quality parameters and their monitoring need to be systematized.
2.7-Innovations and Best Practices :	
2.7.1 Environment Consciousness :	 Waste is segregated by twin-bin system. The college has taken various steps for energy conservation. Tree plantation in the campus & nearby area is a regular practice.

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2.7.2 Innovations:	 Recording attendance of the staff with biometric software. Administration block is fully computerized. Award of 'Best Library User Award' to one male and one female student annually on the Foundation Day of the college.
2.7.3 Best Practices:	 Mega Monsoon Marathon by NSS unit to create awareness about global warming and climate change. Disseminating Gandhian values and practices through Gandhian Center. Visits to old age home and orphanage under the auspicious of Inner Will Club to promote sense of social responsibility.
